RECENT ACTIVITIES

Theatre Party: About fifteen members joined the party to see "The Canterbury Tales" on 27th March, and had an enjoyable evening. We shall be pleased to arrange another theatre visit if there is sufficient demand and if the Committee can receive suggestions as to suitable plays.

Visit to Blenheim: Our coach outing on 16th April proved very popular and was fully booked. We were privileged to have a specially conducted tour of the palace, with no other visitors present, and our official guide was most helpful and informative. We then walked through the park to Bladon church to see Sir Winston Churchill's grave. An excellent tea awaited us at Woodstock, after which we drove home through the Chilterns.

JUNE OUTING

Stourhead, Wilts: The Committee proposes to arrange a coach excursion to Stourhead in south-west Wiltshire, on Sunday, 11th June. This is a Palladian villa with extensive gardens planned around an artificial lake, with rustic

cottages, temples and grottoes - an outstanding example of eighteenth century picturesque landscaping, "the most beautiful form of gardening ever created" (Pevsner, Buildings of England). The route will involve a drive of about 3 hours, passing Stonehenge and other points of interest, and we shall have a picnic lunch on the outward journey.
