Brentham Society Chair's Notes

Now the New Year reviving old Desires

The thoughtful Soul to Solitude retires

- or so claimed Edward Fitzgerald in *The Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam*. No such luck for your Chairman! The start of 2007 has seen us involved in no fewer than five sets of negotiations with Ealing Council about matters which affect the Brentham environment. Briefly, I can report:

The **Article 4 Direction**, about which residents were consulted in December, has at last been approved by the relevant Council committee, and came into force on 8 February. There will be formal notification about this; we will be happy to give more details if required.



Our **petition on the proposed 20mph area**, asking for Brentham to be excluded from the Birkdale Road - Mount Avenue zone, collected over 500 signatures. Presented by Sue Elliott on 16 January, it asked the Council to come and talk to us about more appropriate measures, and I followed this up at the Ealing Area Committee on 6 February. We have now been promised that Officers will be asked to look again at the plan and we hope to be having early discussions with them and the Pitshanger Community Association about other and better ways of dealing with traffic calming in the whole of the Pitshanger area.

The **CPZ re-consultation** being carried out in roads west of Lynwood Road/Birkdale Road has led some residents in Brentham to be concerned about a "creeping" area which would come right up to the conservation area boundary. We are now monitoring the process to ensure that we will be consulted about any extension in the present zone that goes beyond the immediate area bounded by Lynwood Road.

The first analysis of the **wheelie bin consultation** shows that there is a small majority across the Borough as a whole against any change from the present refuse collection arrangements, with over 50% in Hanger Hill ward against introducing wheelies. The Council will now have to decide how to deal with the results, particularly as there were several areas that did vote for them. It is probable that a hybrid scheme will be developed, which will entail further public consultation, in which we would certainly expect to take part.

Street lighting continues to be an issue, and we are in yet more discussions at the moment, with a meeting promised with the Leader of the Council. Together with the Conservation panel and other interested groups in Ealing, we are pressing for changes to the detail of the PFI contract with EdF. We want to see more suitable plans for lighting throughout Brentham, and to preserve at least some of our original cast-iron columns. There are cost implications, so it may be some time before we get a decision, but we will keep residents informed through *Brentham News*.

Brentham Open Gardens Day 2006

We certainly couldn't fault the weather! Sunday, 11th June 2006 was a beautiful hot summer's day. There were ten gardens, of which seven were first-time openers and this proved to be very popular. For the first time there was a plant sale in one of the gardens. We sold more programmes than ever (143) and even ran out of them! This year all proceeds went to charity. £473 was raised and the proceeds went to the Shooting Star House Children's Hospice in Hampton, specifically for the upkeep of its garden project. £115 was raised from the plant sale and went to the Motor Neurone Disease Association.

The gardens were an interesting and varied collection of new, mature, wildlife, cottage and Mediterranean style gardens and all looked beautiful in spite of the hosepipe ban that we had all been so worried about. It



is interesting to see how others cope with different kinds of sites and orientations, including some unpromising ones: the shady dry garden with limited light, the open suntrap garden and the boggy garden.

There was tea and cake in one of the larger gardens, where people nattered to friends about the delights they had viewed. Thanks go to all those who opened their gardens and to all the many and varied helpers who made it such a success. The day ended with drinks and nibbles for all those involved, which rounded off the day nicely.

The Open Gardens Day this year is Sunday 12th June 2007. We would again like to open some new gardens as well as some of last year's. Brentham Heritage Society News

We have two main priorities for 2007. The first is preparing an application to English Heritage for a Blue Plaque for 223 Pitshanger Lane, childhood home of Fred Perry until his hat-trick of Wimbledon wins in the 1930s. Perry doesn't qualify for a plaque until 2009 - the centenary of his birth - but we're starting now because English Heritage asks for substantial biographical background and evidence that no other buildings in London have a better claim. We're lucky to have help with this from Jon Henderson, a sports journalist currently writing Perry's biography. Our other project is a publication explaining how and why Brentham architecture contributes to the estate's special character. This is still in the early planning stages but we want it to be a practical document full of illustrations showing how architectural features were created originally - and how they can be recreated, restored and maintained by today's residents.

Letter to *Brentham News*

I was worried to read in the December edition that the council may introduce wheelie bins for rubbish collection in this area. Wheelie bins would be a disaster for a number of reasons:

1. The black bag system works very well in my street (despite sightings of foxes etc.) Rarely is there a mess and the collection is super-fast and efficient - in fact I have never seen a mess in Winscombe Crescent. The refuse truck is in the road only briefly, and man-hours and street pollution are minimised.
2. The design of my front garden cannot accommodate a wheelie bin, and if it had to 'live' on the street it would bring the look of the neighbourhood down. Apart from the concern over the value of our homes, who wants to live with refuse at the front of their house anyway? I bring my black bags through the house from the rear garden on a Thursday morning - to do this with a wheelie bin would be all but impossible.
3. Wheelie bins would reduce recycling as people would just throw everything into them.
4. Plastic bins would take time to empty into the trucks, hence blocking streets.
5. They are too large for many of the single senior citizens who live on the estate.
6. They are a nightmare for the disabled.
7. Having seen some urban areas that use wheelie bins, they are blighted by them and the bins misused for 'knocking over' games etc.
8. Providing bins would impose a capital cost the Council can do without - if it ain't broke, don't fix it.
9. They become dirty and smelly inside.
10. Last but not least, the absence of wheelie bins is one of the reasons I moved here three years ago!

I know there are many others who feel the same. This is a well-maintained area and I hope our concerns get the appropriate consideration. In a different style of neighbourhood, with large driveways and garages, where the bins could be literally wheeled out on refuse day, it might work - but here many of the homes are terraced or have no driveway and the only option would be to keep them on the street. If bins are adopted they will be an eyesore and an environmental disaster.
