The Society's concern about Council proposals to build on the allotments site, with the possibility of demolition of two houses in Neville Road, has already been stated (Newsletter No. 25). Your chairman has written to the following people, setting out our objections and asking for support:

Local Members of Parliament; local Councillors; heads of relevant Council departments; chairmen of relevant Council committees; heads of relevant GLC departments; several public figures interested in conservation.

We have received a great deal of encouragement and support and there can be little doubt in the minds of the council officers concerned about the weight of opposition to these proposals. We shall keep you advised of further developments.

## CLEANING UP THE BRENT

The Society was represented by its chairman and vice-chairman at the packed public meeting held in St. Mary's Church Hall, Hanwell on 9th May, when the newly-formed Brent River and Canal Society announced plans for a major attack on rubbish,

pollution and obstruction of footpaths along the River Brent and Grand Union Canal.

Your representatives volunteered to take responsibility for patrolling the river between Western Avenue and Perivale Lane and reporting any unsightly objects.
