STREET LIGHTS

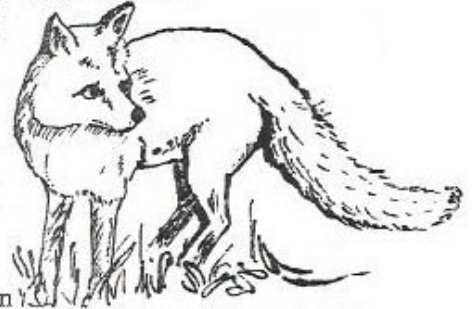

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THE WILD SIDE OF BRENTHAM

NATURE ABHORS A VACUUM

Mike Silverman writes: Some unusual arrivals suggest that if not a vacuum, there must at least be an area of low pressure over Brentham. A sheep was found wandering up Winscombe Crescent by Barbara Murray a few years ago. Perhaps it had been employed by someone to keep their lawn short! Around the corner, in Brentham Way, the Durants came across a dispossessed donkey. Most exciting are the recent sightings of a fox (or foxes) in the back gardens in Brentham Way after an absence of over ten years.



In Spring 1989 a fine, male cockatiel turned up on a tree behind our house, to be enticed into a cage by Mrs. Durant. By co-incidence, her milkman was a keen parrot fancier, but even he was surprised when the bird laid a clutch of eggs! Certain species of parrot have "gone wild" and regularly breed in the London area. Rose-ringed parakeets, attractive birds with bright green plumage and a long tail, were deliberately released into the wild in the 1960s. I have seen small bands in this area.

Some immigrant species are not quite so benign. Last summer a ferret gnawed its way into a cage of guinea pigs in a garden behind Pitshanger Lane and killed them. The tame creature was easily enticed into a basket where we were able to admire its expressive visage - strikingly like that of a sad clown. Ferrets are domesticated polecats, probably of Central European origin. Formerly widespread, their wild British counterparts now survive only in Wales. Our creature had probably escaped recently from captivity. Could feral ferrets join foxes and in some towns, badgers, drawn into the relative wildlife vacuum of urban areas?

AND NOW FOR SOMETHING COMPLETELY DIFFERENT

Residents may have noticed some disruption in Brentham Way recently - a film company were shooting some rather strange scenes involving an old lady sprinting down the street in jogging gear. This, and other scenes, are part of a series of public information films to be shown on television throughout January 1991. They are intended to inform the public about forthcoming changes in Income Tax exemption on Savings Accounts - non-tax payers will benefit. Brentham Society also benefits - by a donation of £150 to the Society, some of which money has been used to provide Christmas gifts for elderly and disabled residents.
